

Why Race?

For the first 15 years of our boating career we cruised. We loved the challenge of navigating (starting with paper charts, a protractor and a divider). We loved the tranquility of anchoring. The best was visiting different harbors, meeting different people and seeing different things. So why race?

Roughly 10 years after we started sailing, we joined the Stamford Yacht Club (Stamford, CT). This was our first club experience. Unlike SMSA, Stamford has only one cruise a year, but it is a big one. The formal cruise takes a week. Planning takes roughly six months, with one or more couples acting as port captains. The cruise fees include dockage, catered dinners, cocktail parties, live entertainment as well as special activities for the kids. About half the boats cruised from port to port. The other half raced from port to port, usually with a spinnaker and a non-spinnaker class. If there was a lay day in a port, there might be a race planned and cruisers would be extended an invitation to crew on a racing boat that day. This was my introduction to racing.

That first start was the encouragement to crew on other boats racing in regular club races and eventually deciding to race my boat, first non-spinnaker then, a number of years later with a spinnaker. What is the attraction of racing? Here are some thoughts:

- You truly enhance your sailing skills. The subject of sail trim becomes much more interesting. You read about it a bit more, and then you have the opportunity to practice what you have learned. Face it, when you are cruising and the wind is on the nose or directly aft and/or the wind speed is too high or too low, there is a strong inclination to kick on the engine. When you race, you have to learn to make the boat go fast in each of these conditions.
- Your competition gives you a chance to measure the growth in your sailing skills.

- Racing is real team sport. If you crew, being a member of a team that works together well brings satisfaction beyond just sailing. If you are racing your own boat, building a winning team is a prerequisite for a winning boat.
- You learn what equipment to add to your boat which makes both your cruising and racing sailing better.
- Racing is like cruising with a group of boats. At the end of the day, you get together with your competitors. These are really great parties. Racing expands your population of friends.

To net it out, racing opens another world of sailing opportunities. Try the Intro class, try crewing. You could be doubling your cruising fun.



Why Cruise?

Do you ever get tired of sailing around in a little circle, but getting nowhere? Distance races are better, maybe, because you get to sail in a bigger circle, but you still go nowhere! Getting tired of apres race parties populated by sweat soaked bodies? There is another alternative: Cruising.

When you cruise you get to exercise your sailing skills a different way. Navigation becomes much more complex than looking for the windward mark a mile away. You actually go someplace, so you have to decide where you want to go and how to get there, as well as where you want to stay on arrival. If you decide to anchor out, you have to remember how to set an anchor and make sure it is not dragging. If you stay in a marina, you have to decide whether or not to eat aboard or go out. If you eat out then a restaurant decision is required. Racing, *i.e.*, sailing in little circles, is much simpler!

Your sailing skills are not as critical, which is good because your crew may be very limited. Cruising gives you a chance to spend quality time with family and friends. Unless there is a real safety emergency, there is never a reason to yell at crew! You can enjoy sailing with folks you would never invite to race with you or who would never race. Most of the equipment that you put on your boat to make it go fast, also works when cruising. However, changing a headsail bent into a racing track, shorthanded might make you start to consider some furling gear.

When you get to harbor, the apres sail social events are different. When you anchor, you have the opportunity to relax in your cockpit and enjoy the scenery. When you tie up in a marina, you have the opportunity to meet and talk to different people.

SMSA presents many opportunities for multi-boat cruising. The Cruise Chair organizes and publishes a schedule of planned cruises. The Cruise Captain provides a focal point for apres sail planning. At every port in a cruise you meet up with good friends. When anchoring out, this could be for a raft-up. In a marina, this

could be a get together on one or more boats. Multiday cruises can feel like multiday floating parties.

If cruising sounds interesting, take the Intro to Cruising class. If you are still interested after the class, take a look at the SMSA cruise schedule (page 14), pick a cruise and let the Cruise Captain know you plan to participate. Doing a SMSA cruise is like racing in that some of the decisions are made for you.

Key West Race Week is the content of racing sailing magazines from cover to cover, less a few meaningless charter advertisements from December to June every year. Every new boat marketed as a racing sailboat or as a cruiser/racer sailboat debuts at Key West in January. It is that big to the industry. It is even bigger to the sport of International sailing. Key West Race Week is professionally managed by Premiere Racing's Peter Craig but a big part of the mechanics of this super well oiled machine is our own Joy Dorothy, Herb Reese, Don Behrens, and Keith Jacobs. In years past Robert Herbig, Tom and Danielle Moulds, Joe and Tracy Kubinec have represented SMSA in Key West committees.

The recession, referred to as "the Crisis" by our Italian friends has hurt the participation at Key West. Just 2 years ago there were 300 boats at KWRW, but last year counted 150 boats and this year a dismal 134 boats. The "crisis" has hit the US as well, but it may have another name. Meanwhile through thick and thin, SMSA members trek south 1300 miles to Key West to mingle with the sports best and represent our little corner of the world. Some members in the employ of Premiere Racing and some SMSA members to compete in this world class event. At the height of KWRW there were 3 SMSA boats going south. Joining *Rhumb Punch* in the J/29 class were *Breakaway* (Leo Bonser) and *Joint Adventure* (Dan and Wendy Schneider). Mike Ironmonger's crew brought their Colgate 26 to Key West in 2008. Clarke and MaryAnn McKinney sailed on *Tigress*, the original SMSA boat to do Key West Race Week that belonged to Bobby Waldeschmidt in the early 90's. *Tigress* stories are still told at Key West Race Weeks to this day as are the misadventures of *Breakaway*.

Unfortunately, not every year is a podium year and this year was a tough one. And even in the "tough years" we all leave Key West happy to have been there. Our noses bloodied maybe, but we are tanned and it was 75 degrees all week; not 25 degrees like at home. Best of all we shared with ten close friends a few rum drinks, a few bicycle rides, a week of sailing, a lot of hours in the hot tub recovering and forming a bond like a pirates code since we are talking about Key West after all.

2011 KEELBOAT SCORING CHANGES

Here is a summary of the important 2011 changes to Keelboat scoring for SMSA. For the most part, the 2011 changes are intended to encourage participation and simplify the scoring process. The specifics of our scoring rules for 2011 will be in Section 19 of the SMSA General Sailing Instructions.

New Dual Rating System: The first change is a dual rating system that has been implemented by PHRF of Chesapeake Bay. For 2011, PHRF certificates will have two ratings, Spinnaker and Non-spinnaker (NS). This dual rating system will eliminate the need for boat owners who carry ratings penalties for spinnaker rig modifications to request a rating change when they want to switch over to NS racing. This is a change that many folks have wanted and is finally being implemented. It does, however, create some extra work for owners at renewal time. *When renewing your certificate for 2011, you must check that you want a NS rating as well as a Spinnaker rating.* If this is not done, the PHRF certificate will only have a Spinnaker Rating and the NS rating will be blank.

PHRF of Chesapeake Bay has said that any boat wishing to participate in a CBYRA sanctioned NS event must have a NS rating on their certificate. This would include many of our SMSA events, and the Screwpile regatta. If you have already sent in your renewal and did not request this rating, the CBYRA Executive Committee has agreed to allow a new certificate to be issued with both ratings. To get this change you must contact Stewart Buckler directly (sbuck7@verizon.net). The cost of dues and certificate renewal for PHRF of Chesapeake Bay for 2011 was reduced from \$35 to \$30.

New Class Splits: The second major change from PHRF of Chesapeake Bay is to the class splits. For 2011, the upper limit for Class A has been changed to 109 from 115. The Upper limit for class B was changed from 154 to 145. Class C will then be 146 and up. The changes should better balance the participation across all 3 classes.

Within SMSA Scoring, the changes for 2011 are the use of Normal (Low point) scoring for all Keelboat events and High Point Percentage scoring for the Season High Point trophies.

The change to Low Point scoring for all events

is meant to simplify the scoring process for everyone (scorer and competitors). We have used High Point in the past for the Wednesday Night and Wednesday Night PRO series and this has led to some confusion and even some interesting outcomes. The High Point scoring methodology was originally intended as a better way to score long series where many boats did not compete (DNC) in all of the races. It simplified the scoring calculations by giving a 0 to all of these DNC boats. With the more sophisticated scoring programs being used today, this is really not a problem.

For our Season High Point trophies we will use a High Point Percentage system. The rules for qualifying do not change. Competitors are still required to participate and be scored in at least 50% of the Qualifying Events. For each event a competitor will have a percentage results. The calculation of this percentage varies based on the event type. For a one day buoy event, the percentage is the competitors finish position divided by the number of competitors. For Distance races, the calculation would include a constant added to the finish position and to the number of competitors to calculate the percentage. The result of this is to add more weight to a distance race score versus a buoy race score. The constant used for each of the distance races will be published in the Scoring section of the General Racing Instructions. A document will be placed on the web site to demonstrate how various participation levels will change the results. The average of the competitors scores across qualifying events after throw outs is the final score. The competitor with the highest average score is the winner.

Finally, the scoring spreadsheets to be used by RC for all events will be posted to the web site. Each RC team should check the web site prior to their event and download the applicable spreadsheet for the event. I will continue to provide worksheets that support Excel 2003 and later releases. If necessary, I can provide Open Office versions of the spreadsheet to those users who do not have Excel. All RC teams are asked to send the resulting spreadsheet to score@smsa.com as soon as possible after the event. This will allow timely posting of results to the web site.



F-f-f-f-frostbite Season is Here!!




