Thank you for volunteering. Thank you for participating. Have a great month on the water.



SOUTHERN BAY CRUISE

Five boats of adventuresome cruisers ventured south on the Chesapeake Bay for an exploration of Onancock, Cape Charles, Hampton, and more. The group took advantage of favorable wind conditions when available and used the iron sail for much of the trip. Some cruisers were more hearty than others, tacking back and forth across the bay. Some just went the more direct route and motor-sailed (*Patty K Too*).

The cruise began on the morning of 5 June with four boats departing Solomons. The first night **Thisilldous**, **Serenity, Walkabout** rafted up with **Patty K Too** for a happy hour in Mill Creek off the Great Wicomico. It was a peaceful night. The next day we took advantage of the southwest winds (9 to 13 knots) and reached across the bay to the winding channel into Onancock. It takes about eighty minutes to go from the outer marker to the marina in Onancock. The weather was HOT so we were happy to have our A/Cs. Martha made

us dinner reservations at The Blarney Stone the first night and Bozzotto's the second night. The food was good at both establishments but service could have been better. John rented a golf cart for the group to use. The town has a few good spots but is not too exciting. However, the bakery is excellent. The flower gardens at the several historic homes were beautiful.





Tuesday morning, 8 June, we were

off for Cape Charles, winding our way into their channel. Winds were out of the SW at 20 to 21 knots. A couple of pods of dolphins paralleled our track for several miles. As we began lining up for the entrance to Cape Charles we noticed there were channel markers missing going into, and in, the Cape Charles channel. **Patty K Too** had to stop and stare at one naked pole – was it a red or green? **Safina**, who came up the previous day helped clarify the status and we passed it along to the other cruisers. The cross winds made it difficult for most of us to get into our slips without dock hands assistance.

Cape Charles is a fun town with shops and several nice restaurants. Some cruisers demonstrated their corn hole skills at the Shanty where we had dinner one night. The next night we went to a favorite, Kelly's Irish Pub, where Guinness stout was a on tap and plentiful. Martha, Carl, Carolyn and Patty tooled around the town with their bikes where they viewed the historic houses and a packed beach.





Off to Hampton on 10 June with the group, except **Walkabout** who headed north. We were once again fighting the breeze on the nose. Why is it that it seems the wind is always on the nose when we are doing destination sailing? It was an easy run to Bluewater Yachting Center where we had our choice of slips on D dock. Nice accommodations and a pool to enjoy. We took the complimentary water shuttle to downtown and walked around. Our group enjoyed a beer at a waterfront brewery before taking the shuttle back to the marina. We took in the NASA Air and Space Museum and the Hampton Museum. Both were enjoyable. Not much to see beyond that in

Hampton, unfortunately. We had our evening meals at the restaurant at the marina and a big happy hour the last evening. Service at the marina restaurant was the best of the cruise.

Sunday morning was clear and calm with light winds out of the ENE and **Patty K Too** and **Safina** left for Solomons. **Walkabout** magically joined our march north by coming out of the Great Wicomico where they had stayed for three nights awaiting better weather. **Patty K Too's** chart plotter went Tango Uniform coming out of Jackson Creek and went old school with the chart book and handheld GPS to complete the trip. These three boats ended the southern cruise on Sunday evening.

Serenity and **Thisilldous** started their trip home on Sunday and anchored in Mill Creek for a happy hour. They made the final trek home on Monday.





SUMMER SOLSTICE CRUISE

As many of the SMSA members know, June 20, 2021 was the Summer Solstice, the longest daylight day of the year and the first day of summer. Last year, the Non-such Sailing Group organized a cruise up the Patuxent River to celebrate the day as well as the river up to the Benedict or route 231 bridge, 17 nm from Solomons. This year, because SMSA was asked to lead this cruise, it was included in the 2021 SMSA cruising plan.

As such, three intrepid SMSA cruisers (**Sabrena**, **Tanqueray IV** and **Safina**) headed out from red marker 6A at Sandy Point between 8 and 9 am on Sunday to sail as far as possible up the river as part of this Solstice or "Sailstice" celebration. The group was joined by one of the "wish-bone rig" Non-such Sailboats (Whiskers 2) to the bridge and back. Because there was minimal SMSA interest in adding an overnight anchorage on the return trip, that portion was canceled.


July 4th 2021 Cruise Carl & Martha Kemp

KEELBOAT RACING

Greetings, fellow Keelboat Skippers and Crew. -I was reminded by a fellow skipper recently that we are moving into the last **3rd segment of our sailing season**. Hard to believe. Not to worry, we have Wednesday Night racing, Governor's Cup, Screwpile and our weekend races. After that 4 Sundays of Frostbite racing. I appreciate all crews that have signed up for RC duties. However, we still need volunteers for Wednesday August 18th & September 1st. If you have not volunteered for RC duties, please take one of those dates. If you have completed one RC duty this year, try a second one out.



CREW: New members are posting to our SMSA Facebook page looking to race on a boat. Please reach out to them and fill your empty spots. I will email to all that are racing, anyone who contacts me looking for a ride.

Race Program: Your PHRF certificate contains two sets of rating numbers. Each boat is given a Windward/Leeward and Random Circular ratings for spinnaker and non -spinnaker configurations. SMSA has only used Windward/Leeward PHRF rating numbers for all of our races regardless of the race course. We will continue to score our formal events (weekend racing) using your PHRF Windward/Leeward rating. Our Wednesday night racing is informal; therefore, we are experimenting a bit this year. We scored the first Wednesday Night series using our traditional windward/leeward PHRF ratings and for the Z-series we used the random/circular PHRF rating. However, for the third Wednesday Night series, B-series, we will use the Random/Circular ratings as the default and score Time on Time. The default wind setting will be light. Here are the formulas that will be used. Be patient with the RC each week as we work through math. If anyone has great excel skills, please let me know. Continued on page 12

I will be working with each RC to process the results.

Light is averaging 8 kts or less and the formula is TCF = 650/(600 + boat rating). The time correction factor (TCF) is then multiplied by the elapsed time to obtain the corrected time. **This is the default for Wednesday night racing.**

Medium is averaging more than 8 kts and less than 16 kts and the formula is TCF = 650/(550 + boat rating). TCF is then multiplied by the elapsed time to obtain the corrected time. This is the recommended default for Weekend and Distance races.

Heavy is averaging more than 16 kts and the formula is TCF 650/(480 + boat rating). TCF is then multiplied by the elapsed time to obtain the corrected time.

Good luck to our SMSA Governor's Cup racers. Be safe and have fun!



Adult Learn to Sail

"So how does the Adult Learn to Sail program work?" "Does SMSA have boats we can check out?" "How long does it take to learn to sail?"

These are typical questions I get regularly when talking about learning to sail with SMSA.

And the most accurate answer to all of these questions in most situations is...It depends and it varies.

So far this season we've worked with over 20 NEW SMSA members to help them get started on their path to enjoying a life-long passion for sailing (we hope!) Our committee has also utilized the talents and efforts of approximately 20 experienced member volunteers to get these people sailing.



"I'm not here to teach you how to sail, I'm here to teach you how to replace me."

I often use the quote above when I'm describing to a new student what to expect . Our program's goal is to generate new SMSA sailors, not just any sailor. Long time SMSA members understand that there *is a difference*. SMSA sailors are not only people who like to sail, but like to give back, and share in the experience in many ways. SMSA sailors daysail, race, cruise, socialize, volunteer on committees, run for board offices and help GIVE BACK to the sport.

So, What can we expect a class/lesson to be like?


We have two basic types of lessons, on the water and shore based.

<u>Shore based lessons</u> are classroom style lectures with videos, demonstrations, Q&A sessions, learning the vocab...all the basic stuff you would expect from a classroom lesson. This season John Auman has run all of our shore lessons and has been doing an amazing job. The lessons are divided into Part 1 and Part 2. The sessions last approximately 2 hours and are full of important information. Students are encouraged to attend/repeat the sessions until they feel confident in the content.

<u>On the water lessons</u> are exactly that. We go out rig the boats, and sail them in and out of the slips, out to the river, round marks practice tacks, gybes, manoverboard drills and other relevant scenarios. Each boat will have one instructor and typically one or two students. This allows for custom tailoring the session to the exact conditions for the day and needs of the students aboard. Most lessons are taught using the 20 foot keelboats (Holder 20's) so there is plenty of room for the students and instructors to sail comfortably as students' skills grow. When appropriate we also run lessons using the club 420 (14 foot dinghy).

Additionally we link the new SMSA members up with our experienced members who get together and will go sailing on the members own personal boats as they are comfortable. Some of the learn to sail participants have joined race crews, and others have spent days on the water with some of the cruisers.

All together this program in 2021 has been a spectacular opportunity to transition people from strangers on the street to SMSA sailing friends.
