Where the Wind Didn't Blow Cruise #1

Compared to the opening cruise weekend the forecast was for little wind but with a shift in direction overnight. We had already changed the venue to revisit Rollins Cove since it was a new spot for Thisilldous (John & Joan Blaney) We had heard from quite a few that they wouldn't be making it but we also heard from Rakali (Mark & Robin Witte) that they would. No Sched.. (Jerry & Donna Taylor) had said they might make it and Godspeed (Randy & Warna Gillies) had indicated a late arrival with no overnight stay. Kalypso remained grounded, Sinbad had family in town for an event, Sabrina had engine



problems and *Serenity* was partying elsewhere. Thanks to all who dropped me an attendance email.

On the way out of Solomons, *Rakali* followed us and at one stage I thought they would blow by us. We could only unfurl the Genoa since we had run into a baulky main halyard the day before. *Rakali* exercised their crew trying out a furling spinnaker, learning what worked and what didn't.



Thisilldous motor sailed and got to Rollins Cove in time for the advertised 15:00 hook drop. I knew Rollins was sheltered but it surprised me by its small size. Being the hook boat for the No Sched.., Thisilldous, Rakali (8.2ft draught), and Godspeed raft, I was caught between enough rode to be safe and short enough so we didn't end up on someone's dock if the wind shifted which was forecast or we dragged. The committee decided to shorten and relocate the raft. We started all 3 motors (Godspeed was still enroute) and Jerry and Mark were

handling directional control and hook placement when I found out my windlass wasn't functional, meaning I had to manhandle retrieval of the hook. I can vouch that the bottom is mud. The value of a working wash down pump became apparent to *Rakali*. *Godspeed* arrived shortly after and rafted up outboard of *Rakali*.

With the raft formed we could start on happy hour. Our next issue was getting the Buffalo Chicken dip warmed up.

We discovered the propane shutoff solenoid was shorting out our electrics so *Rakali* volunteered to warm it up. Meanwhile we got the drinks going. The conversations were wide ranging with everyone learning more about their fellow cruisers. The evening was warm, and calm so that helped.

The raft represented contrasting boat styles and the different design ethos

used. We went from ultra modern sleek Scandinavian design through more traditional narrower cockpits with sugar scoops to a tradition tall center cockpit. That's a conversation starter every time with suitable war stories and note comparing on how stuff got sorted. As usual the party moved boats and tours were conducted.



After the drinks and hors d'oeuvres whether you still needed dinner at 9pm was your choice. Most choose not to but a glorious sunset was had and the sky cleared to a quite cool Milky Way.



Even though we had a flat calm night, it's still a new first time this year sleeping environment resulting in interrupted sleep at best. Most were awake early and got the caffeine going, tea in our case. Then the conversation restarted and didn't end until we decided about 1pm we've had enough of one another and it's time to get back to Solomon's. I jumpered

my windlass relay and thankfully didn't have to manually pull up the muddy chain. The advantage for the non hook boats in a raft is they just drop lines and don't have to get a muddy hook on board. Lucky them and again Continued from page 6

Magothy River Cruise

The Magothy River Cruise (19-22 May) was very enjoyable thanks to the favorable winds, great company, and the perfect May temperatures.

Participants included Fred on *Kalypso*, Martha and Karl on *Serenity* and Alexa and Elliott aboard *STINGRAY*. The first days sail to the Rhode river was completed with winds in the 15-20 kt range, and a nice happy hour was hosted by Alexa and Elliott on *STINGRAY*, where we observed geese, osprey and turtles.

Day two started in thick fog so most of us waited for the fog to burn off a little before starting the trip North to Sillery Bay, on the Magothy. We experienced light winds from the north and calm waters so crossing under the Mid Bay Bridge was rather easy. We saw more



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large tankers anchored south of the bridge than most of us ever recall as we navigated our course between them. *STINGRAY* hosted another fun happy hour, and everyone was im-



pressed by the Tempura Shrimp that Fred on *Kalypso* brought to share. The Magothy is still a fine river, but a cruise up the river revealed how much residential growth has occurred along her banks since the early 1980's when I last sailed there.

Day three was a nice sail back South under the Bay bridge, around Thomas Point and up the west river where we all found safe anchorage. Once we were all anchored, Fred provided water taxi service ashore to Pirates Cove restaurant where Donna (ex *Lickity Split*) met us for a fine dinner.



Day four for the trip home started with moderate winds from the N/NE, so sailing was good on a nearly empty Bay for most of the trip home to Solomons. Martha and Karl on *Serenity* reported seeing a pod of dolphins on the West river, and the *STINGRAY* first mate Alexa observed many ospreys having a very good fishing day. We were all delighted to see The Pride of Baltimore sailing north as we headed home.

STINGRAY hopes to lead this trip again next year and we hope a few more boats can join us for another perfect May cruise.

KEELBOAT RACING

Welcome to summer sailing in Maryland. Summer Series A is complete, as are the Double Handed and Frost-Goode Races. Thank you very much for all the RC teams that have run races so far this season. The racing has been good.

Marks & Course(s): During the Wednesday night A-4 race on May 3, it was discovered that Mark K was no longer in its designated spot. Some quick thinking by

the lead boats informed RC, and the decision was made to use a moored Tugboat and Barge as the turning mark. The fleet was notified over radio, and racing continued for the evening. Mark K was later found washed up along the beach, and Mardy Millen ran -out to pick it up. Its condition was assessed, and plans were put in place to redeploy on May 12. We had Philip Sibley and his diving friends find the old line and concrete anchor, and rerunning

the lines with new Nylon ropes.

Special Thanks to Mardy, Philip (and his diving friends) as well as Joe Frost and Jim Keen for running the RC boat.

A special mark anchor has been created with some of the ashes of our departed sailing friend Brian Steuart. This an-

chor will be used for holding a mark in position at the next available opportunity when another anchor is needed (or next year).

I am working with the Board of Directors to investigate the feasibility of mark tracking in the event any of the marks break loose and drift. It is hoped this can reduce the turn-around time of finding and redeploying marks.

RC: Finally, there is only one (1) more slot available for RC sign-up. The opening is in late summer during the Wednesday Series C-6 on Sept 6. Thank you all for signing up and doing your parts.

We have removed the "hippity-hop" marks from the RC boat. It is desired and encouraged that RC use the larger inflatable marks when setting up X and courses in the river. We are go-



ing to work with the RC Boat Captain to get additional 12 volt outlets installed in the back of RC to assist with inflation.

J/70 Fleet?: There are now ~five J/70's within our club. I have been asked and I will work with scoring to determine the possibility of having a J/70 start and or independent fleet scoring once all five begin showing up. More to come.

Racing Rules: Our Judge has reviewed the rules and we would like to clarify – The Non-spinnaker class can use a pole to hold the Jib to the windward or leeward side, but the



pole must be attached to the mast (RSS 55.2). Alternatively, a person may hold the sheet out to windward or leeward, but their torso must remain inboard the lifelines (unless briefly to perform necessary tasks), and the sheet must be in hand. A person MAY NOT use a boat hook or other equipment to hold the sheet outboard.

Larry is also working hard to attract J-70's from



the very large Annapolis Fleet. He has arranged for FREE slips for the first J-70's that register from out of town. He also made arrangements for launching/loading trailered boats with a very significant discount at Safe Harbor Zahniser's for those boats with trailers that cannot use the public boat ramp under the bridge. Kudos to Larry!
