Two Weeks Until Screwpile 2023

In a short two weeks, 35 boats, ~185 crewmembers, and 65 on-the-water and shoreside volunteers will converge on the nearby waters of the Chesapeake Bay to participate in Southern Maryland Sailing Association's 31st edition of the annual Screwpile Lighthouse Challenge Regatta, an event that has drawn as many as 155 racing boats in past years.

As these 35 boats head out for the racecourse at the 0900 cannon blast signifying Screwpile's harbor start, it will be the culmination of more than 8 months of planning and preparation by numerous SMSA members. With a budget of close to \$25,000 (which also includes in-kind support from sponsors), Screwpile is an enormous undertaking. The support of 17 commercial sponsors and 65 SMSA volunteers will be on display for those 3 days and evenings in Mid-July. Thanks to all of our great sponsors and to our wonderful volunteers who make Screwpile possible!

An interesting look at the demographics of this year's registrants... 4 boats from Northern Bay (Annapolis and vicinity), 2 from Southern Bay (Fishing Bay, Hampton), and 26 local SMSA boats. Hmmm. In most cases the weather turned out to be much more benign than the forecast. So last weekends Herrington Harbor South was very pleasant with lower winds, little rain and only one thunderstorm. I'm getting to the stage where I go with Windy or PredictWind vs Sailflow for forecasts. Of course since your the captain of your ship the decision is yours regarding safety and acceptability of weather forecast conditions. Then there always the admirals override.

We've also had quite a few new cruisers join us, some still race but welcome to all. I've added all of you to our cruisers list so if you want to communicate with the gang reply all to my email and you'll get the latest list.

Let's keep the momentum going. We cruise for social gatherings and a lot of our cruises can be done in whole or in part plus we can even join us by stinkpot or Land Cruiser. It's not how fast you get there but that you get there for the social gathering in a nice spot or a great event. The St Mary's college concert series being one with the July 4th concert on June 30th.

Summer Sailstice was a very nice joint venture with SIYC organized by Dennis Chandler. The outer boats are in charge of moving the raft while the middle boat, mine was chosen to drop the hook since my rode is all chain. It took a drop, recovery and another drop before we got the swing location right. We added a 4th boat to our overnight raft and then the real party started.

Breakfast and coffee revived everyone before a late morning return to Solomon's. The misfortune of being the anchor boat is you get to depart after all the others. It's not just pulling up all that 100ft of rode which just happens to be covered in good old Chesapeake bottom glue aka mud. The stuff also happens to make a fine mess of deckhand and the boat so a wash down hose is an absolute necessity. I'm thinking I'm going to plumb my anchor roller so it gets done as I lift the rode. Idea is patented.

Still it was great fun and our fellow SIYC sailors found a few other SMSA like minds.

But the sail back to Solomons turned into the adventurous leg of the trip. With west winds at 10k and higher, sails were set on a beam reach, and boats sailed off the wind at speeds up to 6-8 kts.



Two nights were spent in Oxford. Arriving on Friday, the Blaney's and the Sibley's hiked to Docs Sunset Grill for dinner. The Eigle's and Kemp's arrived on Saturday after a motor sail up the Bay. 
R2AK Afterthoughts: What Worked, What Didn't By Vladimir Eremeev

R2AK was on my mind for the last 7 years, right from its inception in the adventure sailing world.

However, the logistics felt impossible... so when I decided to do it, the decision was sudden, a bit out of the blue,

and late. At the end of the Everglades Challenge in March 2023, I suggested doing R2AK to a couple of fellow Wa-tertribers. My suggestion was enthusiastically accepted





and Team Trimorons was formed. We had two months to prepare.

The team was truly international. I and the boat were in Maryland, Jeff was in Canada and Chris was in the UK. All were experienced small boat sailors and adventure racers. That said, we had never sailed as a team, and Jeff and Chris had never sailed a Corsair trimaran before. We could definitely have benefited from more time on the boat prior to the race!

Anyway, what worked: Many things!

When I got the boat three years ago, it was in its original and very basic configuration: Just two cruising sails, main and jib, old rigging, no provisions for downwind sails etc.

It suited me well as I handled the boat alone most of the time and never raced her. However, I needed to change a lot for R2AK. So, in preparation, the boat got a much-needed full structural inspection and update. It now has have new stays, new bowsprit, and new bottom paint. Leaks were chased and fixed. Some critical areas reinforced, etc.

And it all worked well: Nothing broke on the boat up until I drove it over a rock:)

The boat got a complement of downwind sails and storm sails. Since I didn't have much time to order brand new class legal sails I went bargain shopping and got decent used downwind sails that were slightly undersized but totally sufficient. We didn't expect to win the race, and the sails worked very well in first days.



Pedal drives were key for the R2AK. Due to time limitation, I went with off-the-

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shelf sea-cycle drives, a common choice for many racers. I used a different approach in mounting them, though: Instead of placing drives aft of the rear beams, I placed them onto trampolines.

The setup proved to be fully functional, though it had its limitations. The most inconvenient part was the need to remove the drive unit when boat picked speed. But overall, it worked well, we could use one or both drives,

steer the boat while pedaling etc..

And it wasn't just about the boat. The trailer was fully inspected, brakes adjust-

ed, bearings repacked, I put new tires all around. The combination of the Ford Transit 150 van and the boat on the trailer proved to be easy to drive and handle. 7000 miles over land went smoothly.

Things that didn't work...

I was very busy with preparing the boat so I let navigation part slide out of my attention. Jeff knew the area, he sailed and lived aboard on Vancouver island in past. He also did all the necessary trip planning on Navionics.



We had a Garmin chart plotter installed in the boat. it came with the boat and I never questioned its functionality. Each of us had Navionics on phones, I had en extra iPad with Navionics, all together we had 5 units running Navionics as a back up. Thanks to Johna's insistence, we also had a full compliment of paper

charts with rulers and dividers and two compasses. ²⁹ So you'd think we had navigation covered.

Well...

The Garmin went blank to base map somewhere north of Seymour Narrows. Apparently it didn't have Canada maps installed!

So we were left with hand held phones as navigation devices. And, I should tell you, with winds in 30+ knots range, constant spray and being covered in water, phones, as well as paper charts, are not user-friendly options for navigation!

As an East Coast sailor I normally pay close attention to depths. But it's shallow on the East Coast. The West Coast looked easy, with extreme depths right until you almost touch the shore.

Except for.... That ONE rock that stuck out pretty far offshore, covered with 2 ft

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of water at high tide. The rock that was ALSO on the charts (had we been able to read them). And the rock that I didn't manage to miss.

The rest of the story is one big wet, cold, mess. We hit the rock hard. The impact drove the daggerboard through its case, breaching into the cabin. The cabin filled with water very fast, we basically had one big gushing hole.



True to its reputation, the boat floated pretty high even with the main hull filled with wate: Farriers are unsinkable!

> We spent three days trying to dislodge the daggerboard from the cracked case. And then we caulked the hole as best we could, reducing the leak to a manageable level and enabling us to sail across Johnstone strait to the nearest extraction point as soon as the weather let us do it (which wasn't particularly soon).

Overall? It was a great, if costly adventure, with lots of lessons learned. It is sad it had been cut short, but hey, there is always next year, right?

As for back up electronics? There is a potentially very good product about to be released by fellow R2AK and Watertribe sailors. I really hope it will fulfill the needs of waterproof functional tablet, designed just for the purpose of navigation of a small boat in wet environment. I placed my deposit already.
