Please welcome our new cruise chair Phil Sibley. We will be gradually transitioning the role over to him in the next couple of weeks.

Get prepared with suggestions for destinations up down and around the bay that we can discuss at our Jan 6th planning

meeting. Its purpose is to figure out a combination of short and long cruises to fill out the calendar from late April to late Oct 2024. We will choose destinations and durations at the meeting and cruise leaders who will be responsible for the intermediate details like anchorages, marinas, restaurants, games, fancy dress parties, and whatever sightseeing might be worth doing. The one thing the cruise chair is not responsible for is leading any or all cruises. So step up to the plate please. Phil, has kids and works so may not be able to participate on many of the longer cruises.

Ideally we try for short weekend cruises early as shakedowns, then for the main months a long and a short cruise. We try not to arrive back Monday and leave later that week on Friday. Remember, Cruising is about the destination not the getting there in a hurry. Racers tend to be go nowhere fast and party in the same place afterwards. We're trying to be mellow and maybe convert them to join us.

I apologize for writing this with the following view. My corona hasn't arrived yet but St Kitts and Nevis are in the distance. Our boat is in Nelson's Dockyard and we're chillin on Darkwood Beach. Cruising in the Caribbean.



Back to reality:

Look out for conflicts with the other club events and avoid them or adapt to compliment them. There are a few standards like July 4th and the Mixed Couples Race/ Battle Creek Raft Up.



Once we get the overall destination calendar set which will be at the meeting. Robin Witte is helping us do that. Thank you.

Now it's up to the individual cruise leaders to flesh out the details of their cruises. Plan on daylight sailing somewhere between 30 and less than 60nms so we can get there by happy hour. Pick anchorages we can navigate into. Remember some draw 8 ft so they need to be able to get into them or at least anchor nearby to dinghy in.

Consultation during the detail planning stage among cruisers is advised as others may have been there before and may like/dislike a specific spot.

The plan and calendar is to have them all fleshed out by early March as the detailed calendar gets published in the Yearbook and on the website. We're driven by that publishing schedule.

So "Be Prepared" to come up with cruise ideas and to volunteer to plan and lead one. They're not onerous tasks and if you wanted to go there on your own you would have the same work to do. We're also willing to assist you to get the plan published in March.

New Year, new opportunities... What are your 2024 sailing goals?

Race marks have been pulled for maintenance and replacement. Thanks to the volunteer crew of RC Captain Joe Frost, Vice Commodore Scotty Roland, and Director Shawn Stanley, who pulled the marks. At this time we plan on placing marks in the same locations as 2023. There are a couple maintenance items that will need to be addressed with the marks before placing them back into the water. Be on the lookout for emails later in Jan & Feb about maintenance days for the marks. Also, I'll need volunteers to help drop marks before the first frostbite in early March so please reach out at <u>keelboatrace@smsa.com</u> if you can assist.

Upcoming Keelboat events:

- The Annual Gala scheduled for Feb 10th.
- Keelboat pre-season meeting is scheduled for February 21st.
- Rules of Racing seminar is scheduled for March 2nd.
- First Spring Frostbite is scheduled for Sunday, March 3rd.
- Race Management Basics, Wednesday, April 3rd

We are also looking for feedback and input to improve, add or change things up a bit in our keelboat program. Some suggestions received so far:

- Independent J/70 class this will reduce the B fleet significantly, but will result in one design competition. More thoughts and impacts to follow.
- Changing from PHRF class designation to SMSA determined class designation. This will allow SMSA to size the fleets based on the number of participants making for even numbers of boats per class, but may make boats previously in a fast fleet, now dominate a slower fleet. More discussion to follow.

Screwpile 2024... July 19th-21st

Screwpile is scheduled in its customary midsummer weekend... July 19th-21st, with regatta headquarters and awards parties at Safe Harbor Zahnisers Marina. Now that Solomons Inn Resort & Marina (formerly Holiday Inn) promises to be back in business offering discounted rooms to Screwpile crews, we hope to attract a good number of out-of-town boats this year.

We believe the hotel's unfortunate closure in October 2022 was primarily responsible for the disappointing Screwpile participation last year by non-SMSA boats. Fortunately, a favorable zoning decision by the Calvert County Commissioners resulted in rejection of a plan to convert the hotel into a commercial assisted living facility.

For the second year, Screwpile will host the PHRF of the Chesapeake Mid-Bay Championships. You have probably seen the four large perpetual trophies in our trophy case that were won by SMSA crews last year... One Trick Pony (PHRF A), Wicked Good (PHRF B), Barba Roja (PHRF C), and Stingray (PHRF NS).

The success of thirty-one years of Screwpile has been made possible by the many, many dedicated volunteers who have served on the water as well as shoreside... operating their own boats for race committee, deploying and retrieving race marks, timing starts and finishes, handling signal flags, serving as protest judges, selling drink tickets, serving Mount Gay Rum drinks, pouring draft beer, delivering ice, managing trash, taking photos, managing trophies, stuffing Skippers' bags... the list of duties goes on and on. Kudos to the many volunteers who have taken on this multitude of necessary tasks over the years! Notice... we will soon be contacting previous volunteers to confirm this year's participation as well to encourage new club members to join in on the fun on Screwpile weekend.

I can tell you from my many years of personal experience on both sides of this regatta... either racing my own boat, serving as Race Committee, and most recently being in the middle of planning and managing the regatta, it's all a very rewarding and FUN time! 
