Commodore's Corner

I've been doing some reading recently when not working on my boat and discovered a bunch of articles on racing - to use the rules or not. So as a cruiser, I was curious and after pouring through the articles, IMHO some prime guiding principles seem to be much better than the RRS's.

I saw that the current RRS '25-'28 is nearly 160 pages long. However pages 13 to 35 seem to be what really matters on the water. The rest is getting there.

Page 13 has two basic principles "Sportsmanship and the Rules" and "Environmental Responsibility". For the first one, the participant is expected to follow the rules but also to enforce them. So the participant is both a Player and a Referee, seems like a conflict to this cruiser.

Then they call sportsmanship as taking a penalty upon breaking a rule if not exonerated. That sets the expectation that rules will be broken. If that's the opening gambit of the "rules" then why bother to have them at all.

The environmental responsibility part seems to be common sense but probably as discardable as the rest of the rules.

As I kept reading, this next part was interesting to this cruiser as well, Part 1 Fundamental Rules. Helping, life preserving PFDs, fair sailing, it's your decision to race, and you accept the rules! Seems that putting someone in danger should be avoided and no matter whether racing rules are used or not there's the COLREGS and IRPCAS which have the overriding emphasis to avoid a collision even if you have the right of way. I guess in the heat of the battle to win a race, this rule needs to be emphasized....hmmm.

Part 2, When Boats Meet, this seems to set the expectation they will "meet" not "nearly meet", where meet = collision. Article 14 Avoiding Contact starts "If reasonably possible..." appears to open the door to contact, not avoiding it. The emphasis seems to be all wrong, shouldn't contact be avoided.

Part 3, Conduct of a Race has more to do with being RC and getting a race started, run, changed, and concluded. There are a couple of sail the course instructions, don't hit marks or RC boats but not other boats.

Part 4, Other Requirements which includes Rule 42 Propulsion. This prevents ooching, aahing, pumping, etc. as motive power. If it works why not and let eve-

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ryone do it, but then again, I'm just a cruiser.

Finally Rule 43 explains Exoneration as if you got forced to break a rule you're ok. This one has me scratching my head a bit.

Part 5, Protests aka the lawyer bits. Why not say that a protest will result is a disqualification if you lose the protest, make the penalty not worth it.

Part 6, Entry and Qualification. The paperwork to get on the water.

Part 7, Event Organization. Lots of organizer issues to deal with. Why would you run an event? Seems like a lot of red tape.

Then there are 100 pages of appendices (Appendices A - T). Most are for racing variants such as windsurfing, kiteboarding, radio controlled, match, and team racing. Then others deal with Sail #'s, weights, NOR's, SI's while others deal with Protest committees, appeals, juries arbitration (lawyers anyone) and special attention for Rule 42 Propulsion.

Can it get more complicated? The RRS represent 100 years of complexity on complexity with some simplification attempted. Seems like we could get rid of the lawyers sweating over every word and start afresh with a couple of basics.

- 1. Avoid collisions or else you're disqualified.
- 2. Starboard had right of way.
- 3. Rounding corners stay in your lane.

The rules of the road are simpler than the RRS.

I guess I'll get an earful from my racer friends.

Help Needed! Small Boat Racing Safety/Mark Boat Drivers & Crew



Your Safety Boat Captain (Randy Gross) is seeking Cruisers, Keelboat crew, and other club members interested in becoming Safety/Mark Boat drivers and/or crew. Come have an enjoyable evening on the water learning more about sailboat racing surrounded by enthusiastic, talented racers. If you want to watch some great racing while helping this

very appreciative group, this is your chance.

Every Thursday Evening throughout the summer (and some weekends), a dedicated cadre of SMSA sailors compete in multiple Small Boat races. While they do a great job taking turns to man the Race Committee boat, it can be challenging to also man the club's Medium Skiff as a Safety/Mark boat to support the races.

The Safety/Mark boat's primary purpose is to render assistance to any sailor who may capsize/turtle their boat or have any other breakdowns. Additionally, having a boat available to move Marks when the wind shifts greatly increases the Race Committee's ability to provide timely, competitive, race courses. Sometimes, towing boats back into the harbor when the wind dies is also called for.

For drivers, experience operating small outboard boats is desired, but I am willing to train. For crew, the ability to safely walk around on a small boat, is the only requirement, though being able to pull up and deploy the Mark anchors is a big plus.

The more availability the better, but even once a month would be a great help. I got into doing Small Boat Race Committee because I was getting too stiff and clumsy to move around on the racing boats, but I still wanted to be involved in sailboat racing. This has worked out great for me, and I have found the racers to be VERY appreciative at the bar.







